To celebrate the bicentenary, the children took part in a special service conducted by the Bishop of Exeter, the Right Reverend Robert Atwell at St Mary's Church, Lynton. During the service the children marked the occasion with songs, poems, reflections and prayers. Following the service, the Bishop led a procession down to the school where he rededicated our current building. Councillor Frankish, Town Mayor, then unveiled our beautiful mural which was commissioned by the PTFA to commemorate

this memorable event. The mural was designed by local artist Helen Purrington-Bolton and depicts the local environment of Exmoor within which our federation nestles. A stair-case of books represents the pathway of learning which leads our children successfully into the future. The values of our federation, CARIS (meaning love), is clearly represented on a signpost leading towards Curiosity, Achievement, Respect, Inspiration and Support through which we seek to nurture our children to be the very best they can be and to equip them with the skills that will enable them to flourish within an ever changing world. Associate Governors are a group of 12 upper Key Stage 2 pupils based in both Parracombe and Lynton who have worked hard this year to develop clear channels of communication for pupils to voice their opinions about their learning. Our Associate Governor team were invited to give a presentation at Robinswood Primary school in Gloucester this week. It

was a brilliant opportunity for us to meet up with other Associate Governors and discuss how our schools are similar and how we do things differently. The pupils discussed ways in which they could continue to work closely with the teams from 11 other primary schools over the internet next year



<u>Curriculum Focus</u>: As the school year comes to an end, we are focussing on covering areas that may have caused problems over the year and recapping place value, times tables and the basic four functions through measurement and money. The year 3 and 4 classes are also learning about length and perimeter.

How you can help: it would be useful to practice times tables with your children as much as possible.

A special thanks must go out to our amazing cast, who put on a brilliant show this year. We are reflecting on this year at school during English lessons. The year 5s are writing prayers and wishes for the year 6s whilst the year 6s are preparing their leaver's books and writing up their school memories in readiness for their Leaver's services. Over the next couple of weeks, the children in year 3 and 4 will be practising their story writing skills and writing an adventure based narrative.

We are still very busy with sport. As if the World Cup and Wimbledon weren't enough the West Exmoor Federation is swimming and the year 5/6 are developing their skills and strategy for the annual upper Key Stage 2 basketball tournament at the end of our sessions in West Buckland.

Our current school uniform supplier Dawes, have informed us that their uniform will only now be available to purchase online, through their website <u>www.schoolthreads.org</u>. A 10% discount is available from them on uniform ordered by the 15th July (please quote WESTEXFED18). We have samples of the various sizes, which are available in each school, should you wish to try these for size. To help save delivery charges, on orders sent out to parents, we have arranged to receive a bulk delivery at each school, every half-term and will inform you next term the dates by which orders will need to be placed online, for the school delivery.

We are also pleased to inform you that Excel Embroidery at Excel House, Wilder Road, Ilfracombe, EX334 8BS, will also be stocking the West Exmoor Federation uniform, at very competitive prices. As we currently purchase the Federation yellow hoodies from Excel, we know that their garment quality is good and this will give parents the opportunity to choose their preferred supplier.

Excel Embroidery's uniform will be available either from their shop, or online <u>www.excelembroidery.co.uk</u>. They are in the process of adding details of our uniform to their website, where their prices can be viewed. Initially they will print the uniform to order, which can then be collected from their shop or sent out to you within 10 working days. When they have established the stock that they will require to meet the needs of the Federation, uniform will be available within a week.

From the Rectory

Dear Friends,

Last week I enjoyed sharing a rather wonderful story with the children of our primary schools: "The Man Who Planted Trees" (by Jean Giono). It is a modern fable written in the wake of the Second World War, but the story begins in 1913 when the narrator, on a walking holiday, comes across a largely abandoned village in the foothills of the Alps. He is given hospitality by an old shepherd who surprises him after supper, by getting out a bag of acorns and counting out one hundred sound acorns. The next day he takes them out and plants them, one by one, in the valley. He explains he has been doing this for three years – planting over 100,000 acorns. Ten years later the man visits again, and by now the trees are saplings, the very old man has given up the sheep who might damage them, and become a bee keeper. The dried up river bed at the bottom of the valley is flowing as a small brook. Year by year, the narrator goes back, continuing after the old man has died. By then there is a flowing river, a lush hillside, and the abandoned houses have been rebuilt. The village is a flourishing community. Because a man imaginatively and faithfully planted acorns, a community is revived.

It made me reflect that so much of life is focused on what is *immediate* and brings quick results. This has its place and we can all think of times when a quick response is necessary. Sometimes though, I think it may be good to take a step back and look at the long view. Most of the most important decisions we make, and our significant commitments are about taking the long view: planting acorns whose growth and effect we won't fully know in our own life times.

I am reminded of this when I share in the joy of couples celebrating their marriage, or parents bringing children to baptism. It is also very humbling to share with those remembering a loved one the impact for good one person's life can have on those around them.

If we look around us, we can see how we now benefit from the "acorns" planted by those who have gone before us. We're celebrating the bi-centenary of a school in Lynton, using buildings provided by the great benefactors of the area, sustained by the husbandry of generations who've farmer here: all as a result of the generous commitment to a long view of life here from those who have gone before us.

So I am now wondering, how might we, in our turn, be those who "plant acorns" for the future of this place?
