HERE COME THE ANGLO SAXONS!

Next term our theme will be 'Who do you think you are?'. The history element of this theme will be the Anglo Saxons and to get the new school year off to a flying start our children will be taking part in an Anglo Saxon enrichment day. During the course of the day, the children will take part in practical workshops to explore a variety of topics such as who the Anglo Saxons were and where they were from; what daily life was like in Anglo Saxon times, including food and clothing; money and trade; war and conquest; writing, runes and manuscripts; the birth of the English language; crafts and skills; and religion, including mythology and the conversion to Christianity. In order to make the day as memorable as possible we would like the children to come to school wearing a home-made Anglo Saxon costume and shield. This does not need to be elaborate – the company running our workshop give some ideas on their website https://vikingschoolvisits.com/costume-ideas-for-dressing-up-day/ Children in Key Stage 2 will take part in their enrichment day on Thursday 6th September; Key Stage 1 will have their day on Friday 7th September.

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WEST BUCKLAND SWIMMING AND PE

It has been wonderful to see the children progressing so much in their swimming over the last couple of weeks. The confidence that even our youngest children show in the water is amazing and the number of children who can competently swim 25m is staggering. We really are very lucky to be able to access the outstanding facilities at West Buckland. The children have certainly enjoyed the space provided by the Jonathon Edwards Sports Hall and again it has been good to see how their ball and tactical skills have improved through our intensive PE sessions. I am delighted to be able to tell you that we have already booked our pool and sports hall sessions for next summer and that we are hoping to also offer all of our children a practical first aid course alongside these sessions.

It has been a true pleasure to present so many of our children with certificates and book tokens for having read 200+ nights during the course of the school year. Reading is so incredibly important as it really does lay the foundations for all other aspects of learning. I am so appreciative of the time that you give to our children in supporting their reading at home – it really does make a huge difference. Please do keep up the good work and encourage your children to read daily throughout the summer – just a few minutes a day will help to maintain their competence over the holiday and ensure that they can pick up where they left on when they return in September.

LYNTON BUILDING WORK

Over the summer holiday there will be significant building work taking place at Lynton. Our Key Stage 1 toilets are being completely refurbished to provide a light and bright environment which will hopefully be considerably more appealing to the children. We are also opening up the free-flow steps between our Reception and Year 1/2 classroom – some of you may remember these from a time gone by! Reopening these steps will enable the children to move more easily between the two rooms when working as a larger, collaborative group. The school hall is also going to enjoy a much needed make over and new lighting will be installed in our library. We are also hoping to extend the safety surfacing in the outdoor space which is accessible to our reception children. The new space created by moving our boundary has completely transformed this area and I know that Sarah, Joe, Sharla and Sammy have great plans for it next term. These improvements are all part of our ongoing drive to ensure that our children are taught in an environment which inspires and stimulates learning and of which we can all be proud.

Rugby tots next term


We are delighted to be welcoming John from Rugby tots back next term. John will be continuing his work with the KS1 children as follows:

Cheques should be made payable to Devon County Council.

<u>Christchurch – Parracombe. Community Box</u>

Carol Brunner has set up a trial of a community box at Christ Church in Parracombe where people can leave any spare tins of food, bottles of water, plasters (!) and those who need them (for example busy mums who have forgotten there is no longer a shop in the village and have nothing for tea, walkers who have used all their drink or are crippled with blisters) help themselves. The watch word is: Give when you can, take when you need.

From the Rectory

Once more the summer months bring us into the season of "Epilogues" at Countisbury Church (8.30pm on Sundays through the summer until the 2nd of September). Each week this short service is led by a different person, exploring something that is meaningful to them and there is the opportunity for a convivial gathering at the Blue Ball afterwards. The services were the inspiration of John and Pauline Pedder as a way to keep Countisbury Church in use as a place of worship. I think the small group of us who make the pilgrimage up the

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church path each week during the summer would agree, these services offer a real gift, a way to end the day peacefully, surrounded by the stunning beauty of the moor and coastland of Countisbury Hill, watched over by the swallows who return to the nest in the porch and held by the ancient walls of the church itself. During the remarkable weather of late June and early July, our journey home was graced by spectacular sunsets too.

In the service I led, I took as my inspiration the church of St John the Evangelist, Countisbury, itself. For me it's a church which inspires worship of the Creator on behalf of all creation as it sits so comfortably in its land; it is a place of memory, holding the history of so many local families in the churchyard and in the remembering of all who have celebrated baptisms, marriages and kept the sabbath within, reminding us we do not walk this way alone, but in the companionship of all who go before and come after us; and now it is a place of shelter for today's pilgrims, stepping aside from the coast path, out of the elements, to take a deep breath and find a bit of peace, a space to encounter God, however that be, for each visitor.

Each of the church buildings of our Mission Community has its own particular character, its own relationship with its land and people, its own offering of space to encounter God. Each congregation has taken the decision to make sure they are open during the day. Our Visitor Books are full of appreciation from those on holiday in the area who have discovered beauty, stillness and peace in these holy places, and in Lynton the prayer board holds safely the prayers that a church visit prompts.

It is worth remembering that you do not have to be on holiday to step through the open door of a quiet church. Might this summer be a time to be curious about the churches across the Mission Community that you don't know well – to spend some time St Mary's Lynton, St Bartholomew's Barbrook, St John the Baptist's Lynmouth, St John the Evangelist's Countisbury, St Brendan's Brendon, Christchuch Parracombe, St Martin's Martinhoe or St Peter's Trentishoe (or if away from the Lyn Valley, in a local church that is new to you)? Might you take with you someone who would like to visit but cannot get there themselves? I wonder what you might find, what might touch your soul, while you are there.
