REMEMBRANCE SERVICE

On 9th November, the children within Rivers, Oceans, Oaks and Forests marked the hundred-year anniversary of the end of the First World War with a special Remembrance Service at Woody Bay Train Station. The locomotive AXE provided a poignant focal point, creating a very real link with those who served on the front line and with those who gave their lives for the freedom that we enjoy today. The

children read out some beautiful poems and prayers that they had written and, after observing a two-minute silence, the children placed poppy crosses in the Remembrance Garden. I was so proud of our children, who showed great respect for the occasion and were clearly moved by the service. This is the 10th Year that we have been privileged enough to hold our Remembrance Service at Woody Bay; a tradition that I hope will continue for many years to come to ensure that the younger members of our community continue to understand the importance of Remembrance – a time for reflection and a time to pray for peace; and a time to give thanks for all those who have died in war.

CHILDREN IN NEED

Well done to all of our children who entered so fully into the spirit of Children in Need on Friday. The children thoroughly enjoyed wearing non-uniform with many sporting spotty clothes, Pudsey outfits or pyjamas. The children at Parracombe and Kentisbury also ran a bring-and-buy cake sale with unwanted toys and delicious cakes helping to raise additional money for this well-worth cause. Across the federation we raised an incredible £289.84! Thank you to everyone for making the day such a huge success.



E-SAFETY

Do you know what your child gets up to on-line? Do you know that they are safe? If they are chatting to 'friends' on-line, do you know who they are? We are increasingly concerned about the number of children who are telling us that they are playing games on-line that are not age appropriate and talking to us about the 'friends' that they have made on-line. At school we frequently talk to the children about how to stay safe on-line but I am conscious that we need to

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work together to ensure that our children do not fall prey to potential perpetrators who are increasingly targeting children via mobile apps and games. www.nspcc.org.uk/preventing-abuse/keeping-children-safe/online-safety/ all provide helpful advice for parents and it's well worth spending some time browsing their sites, especially if you feel your child is more tech savvy than you are! Here are some suggestions from internetmatters for helping to keep your children safe:

Internet safety checklist for young children

Agree boundaries

Be clear what your child can and can't do online – where they can use the internet, how much time they can spend online, the sites they can visit and the type of information they can share. Agree with your child when they can have a mobile phone or tablet.

Explore together

The best way to find out what your child is doing online is to ask them to tell you about what they do and what sites they like to visit. If they're happy to, ask them to show you. Talk to them about being a good friend online.

Put yourself in control

Install <u>parental controls</u> on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. Set up a user account for your child on the main device they use and make sure other accounts in the household are password-protected so that younger children can't access them by accident.

Use airplane mode

Use airplane mode on your devices when your child is using them so they can't make any unapproved purchases or interact with anyone online without your knowledge.

Stay involved

Encourage them to use their tech devices in a communal area like the lounge or kitchen so you can keep an eye on how they're using the internet and also share in their enjoyment.

Talk to siblings

It's also a good idea to talk to any older children about what they're doing online and what they show to younger children. Encourage them to be responsible and help keep their younger siblings safe.

Search safely

Use safe search engines such as <u>Swiggle</u> or <u>Kids-search</u>. You can save time by adding these to your 'Favourites'. Safe search settings can also be activated on <u>Google</u> and other search engines, as well as <u>YouTube</u>.

Check if it's suitable

The age ratings that come with games, apps, films and social networks are a good guide to whether they're suitable for your child. For example, the minimum age limit is 13 for several social networking sites, including Facebook and Instagram. Although sites aimed at under-10s like Moshi Monsters and Club Penguin also have social networking elements.

CHASING OF LETTERS AND PAYING OF MONEY

In recent months my admin team have commented about how much time they are spending chasing up the return of consent letters. On occasions they may send home three or four reminders about the need to return consent forms and even then find that they have to call a number of parents to confirm whether or not their child is going to participate in an event, for the example the pantomime visit. Clearly this is not a productive use of their time and, as parents, we need to take responsibility for checking our emails and/or child's book bag for school communications on a regular basis and then ensuring that we respond accordingly within the timescales set out. In order to reduce the time that my admin team spend chasing up forms, I have asked that they send out no more than two reminders, after which we will assume that those who have not returned forms do not wish their child to take part in the event. In order to avoid disappointment for your child, please do ensure that forms are quickly returned to school. Thank you.

In collective worship we have been thinking about the Bible and how the books within it can guide us in our daily lives. We have also been exploring spirituality and prayer. We have been praying for those who are sad and for those who are less fortunate than ourselves.

Streams & Young Buds

English



In English we are looking at the text 'Stick Man' by Julia Donaldson. You can help your child with their learning by exploring past and present tenses of words. For example, ran, running, run. We will also be learning about verbs and adverbs. For example: a verb is an action word such as run, walk, cry. An adverb is a word to describe the action for example, slowly run, happily run, quickly run.

Maths

In maths we are learning about addition and subtraction. The children will be exploring how a single number can be composed of different number bonds for example 7 is composed of 0 + 7, 1 + 6, 2 + 5....This will move onto understanding the relationship between addition and subtraction and the children will be using inverse to check their answers. For example: checking that 8 - 5 = 3 by adding 3 + 5 = 8.

Please continue to use Mathletics to support your child's learning. The content is closely linked to the subject content at school. If you are unable to access the site through your tablet or computer please do not hesitate seek advice at school.

Christmas Nativity

Our Christmas services will take place on 19TH December at 10:30am and 5:30pm at Kentisbury (am) and Parracombe (pm). These services will be attended by the children from Kentisbury and Parracombe.

On the 20th December Lynton will have their Christmas service at 10:30am and 5:30 also. This service will be attended by the children from Lynton School.

The scripts are in the process of being sent home. Please practice the lines with your child.

Rivers & Oaks

The children have had a fantastic first couple of weeks back. We hope they had a wonderful holiday and are ready for a busy, exciting half term.

In English, we are moving on the narrative where the children will be using their creative imagination. We will be looking at lots of different writing skills and putting them into practise. Please encourage them to read a variety of books of varying themes so they can expand their interests and knowledge.

Addition and subtraction is our new maths unit where we will be focusing on different mathematical vocabulary and methods for adding and taking away. This is a vital skill that is imperative for the children to master.

With regards to homework, there has been confusion over whether it has been set or not and when it is due. Oaks homework is set and due in on a Wednesday and Rivers is set and due on a Friday. Please support and encourage your children to give the homework a go. It shouldn't be a long, tedious task and any queries or questions, please come in and ask.

Thank you to all who participated in this, as we are constantly trying to monitor, and develop, what we are doing for our children. The responses were overwhelmingly positive; I am glad to say. To precis the responses they were reflected in the following comments:

FROM THE RECTORY

There was a time, hundreds of years ago, when St Martin's day (11th November) marked the turning of a church season, and there was a longer time of preparation for Christmas than the four weeks we will keep as Advent in December. Some Anglican churches now draw wisdom from that tradition and call the month of November "Kingdom season", marking the time with red altar frontals and vestments. It is a time when we think about what we mean by the line familiar to anyone who knows the Lord's Prayer: "Thy Kingdom Come". We remember that we are living in an "in between time".

Christians believe that in his life, death and resurrection, Jesus overcame the ultimate power of all that opposes and obstructs the love in which and for which God made the world. He came to invite and bring everyone into the life of loving God and neighbour for which we are made. His resurrection was the pledge of the triumph of love over even death and points us towards the promise of the fulfilment of love's victory over all things: the Kingdom of God. But that fulfilment is still to come and this invitation is that we become part of its fulfilment by following Jesus in choosing love over hate, self-giving over selfishness.

St Martin started his life as a soldier, but inspired by his faith, he grew in generosity to the poor, and care of the vulnerable and the best known story told of him is when he used his military sword to cut his cloak in half to clothe a beggar dressed only in rags. His was a journey from a world of force and violence to one of care and love.

Our Remembrance celebrations this month help us see that we too can be on that journey. As we recall the costly sacrifices of war, and the thanksgiving that will have been felt here amongst people like us, one hundred years ago, we know only too well that we live "in between" the Armistice and a world in which force and violence has given way to care, love and peace.

In our remembering there remains the invitation to become part of the fulfilment of the journey ourselves – following Jesus, like St Martin, in choosing love over hate, self-giving over selfishness – looking for the coming of God's Kingdom of love.
